

Angel Calderon



Angel Calderon was born in Guatemala and migrated to Australia in 1985, after living in Mexico, Honduras and Panama. He spent 1986 learning English at several Adult Migration Education Service centres in Melbourne. He studied journalism in Latin America. He holds a BA (Swinburne) in sociology and politics and a MA (Monash) in applied social research. Since 2009 he has been Principal Advisor (Planning and Research) at RMIT University.

In this presentation, Angel Calderon will focus on the creative process that is derived from a life that has been determined by conflict, uncertainty and the experience of exile.

Certainty has not been the norm in Angel's life; it is rather an ephemeral passage that he idealises by the shape and form of the strokes that are latent in his paintings. He has chosen painting as the ideal form to express emotions about conflict in his homeland (Guatemala), the disappearance of his brother in 1982, diaspora and his Australian journey. Painting has enabled him to bring a different narrative to the experience of conflict and reconciliation and how life might be pursued in new times and new places.
